In youth we are walking through the narrative of the Bible, taking a look at the history of God's people in chronological order. I love the Israelites and all that they can teach us about God and about us, so it is hard for me to leave anything out of the story.

One of the things I had to skip last week was this passage from Joshua 5 where Joshua meets the commander of the Lord's Armies. Joshua 5:13–14 (CSB)

When Joshua was near Jericho, he looked up and saw a man standing in front of him with a drawn sword in his hand. Joshua approached him and asked, "Are you for us or for our enemies?"

"Neither," he replied. "I have now come as commander of the Lord's army."

Then Joshua bowed with his face to the ground in homage and asked him, "What does my lord want to say to his servant?"

What jumps out at me is this question, that I think is one that is natural to ask, "Are you for us or against us? Are you on our side or on their side?" I mean, isn't that what we want to know all the time? Is God on our side or is He on the other side? Is God for what I am for or is God for what they are for?

But the answer is one that I find truly amazing. The commander of the Lord's army looks at Joshua and says, "Neither."

Now that can sound a little weird, especially if you are about to lead a group of people into a hostile land and try to drive out their inhabitants all because this same Lord that the dude is talking about commanded you to do so. Like, isn't God of course on the Israelites side? Didn't God command them to come here? So why isn't he on their side? But the man standing before Joshua is not for him, and is not for his enemies. He is not the commander of Joshua's army or of Jericho's. He is on God's side. He is the commander of God's army. Joshua and the Israelites have been invited to join in God's plan and they are going to have a part to play in his mission moving forward, but ultimately it isn't about their side or their enemies' side, but rather God's.

I know that for me it is so easy to try to get God to be on my side. It is easy for me to pray for God to get my back. It is easy for me to look out at those who are opposed to me and think that God must be against them too.

But it isn't about whether or not God is on my side. It is whether or not I am on His side that matters. God does not line his life up to mine. I am the one who must line my life up with him.

This is both a difficult and an amazing thought. It is difficult because it doesn't mean that I am fighting God's fight just because I am facing opposition. It is difficult because it requires me to examine my life and make sure that I am fighting for what God fights for and not just for what I want to fight for.

It is amazing, though, because it is freeing to know that God doesn't depend on me. God fights for His glory. God fights for His purposes. I don't have to worry about what is the right fight or worry about whether He will join me. God is on His side, and as such He will always overcome.

The amazing thing is, because He loves me I get to join in and be a part.



The story behind the song: "Lord I Need You" by Matt Maher, Kristian Stanfill, Christy Nockels, Jesse Reeves, and Daniel Carson as told by Matt Maher to **New Release Today**

This song was written with four other songwriters. It is a pretty great bunch of writers—Kristian Stanfill. Christy Nockels, and two of Chris Tomlin's band mates. Jesse Reeves and Daniel Carson. We were getting together to write for the Passion 2011 conference. I was a newlywed, and my wife graciously agreed to accompany me. It was really a process of collaboration. Somebody wrote a line, and it was like passing the baton. Somebody else wrote a line, and so on. About halfway through of the process of writing this song, Jesse said the song reminded him of the hymn "I Need Thee Every Hour." We pulled up the lyrics, and started mining from that song a little bit. I remember when the lyrics, "Where You are, I am free, holiness is Christ in me" were written, that was a big moment.

What is the takeaway message for listeners and the Church?

The process of writing this song and a lot of songs for worship leaders is that the writing of worship songs is an act of worship. That's an opportunity where God ministers to us. Then, we go and lead worship and every time we lead people in worship, it's a confirmation of when we wrote the song. That's the case for me with this song.

In your joy, you need to still say, "Lord, I need You, oh I need You, every hour I need You,"—not just in your brokenness and darkest times. I think that's a struggle for people. A lot of Christians tend to look around and think the world is in a dark place, we're struggling economically and there's so much division in our country, but there's always a reason to have joy.
