
Before you Lose Your Faith: Deconstructing doubt in the church

You may have heard the term "deconstructing" bouncing around social media lately. It is a term that has come to be used by those who are wrestling with what they believe and if they are going to continue to believe it. This book is marketed as a book for those people, the ones who are choosing to "deconstruct" to read as a way to, I guess, keep them from deconstructing. At least I think that is the goal.

The book is a series of essays and I found the first few essays to be very condescending in tone. I think that for someone who was struggling with what they believe those chapters might cause them to stop reading. There are some later chapters that I think would be a little more helpful, unfortunately I think by that time most of the book's target audience might have already given up. So, if you are or know someone who might be beginning down a deconstruction type path this might not be the best resource to pick up.

"I will raise my eyes to the mountains; from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth." (Psalm 121:1-2)

Psalm 121 provides great comfort and strong reassurance

to us as we follow after Jesus. The psalmist, most likely King David, begins by looking ahead to the path in front of him and he asks, "Where does my help come from?" David then answers, "My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth." God is indeed the source of our help and protection each day.

Psalm 121 was a song that was likely sung by the Jews as they journeyed to Jerusalem for religious feasts. David uses the imagery of mountains to convey both the majesty and the power of God. David's gaze didn't stop when he looked upward to the hills, but he looked beyond them to the God who made the mountains. David found comfort and refuge in a God whose power is unlimited. The psalmist acknowledges that although dangers abound, it is only by the grace of God that we can stay on the right path. David reminds us that God is our keeper and that He has protected us in the past, He has promised to provide for us in the present, and He will faithfully lead us to persevere in the future.

In 121:8, David closes out the psalm with a promise, "The Lord will guard your going out and your coming in from this time and forever." This promise is comprehensive. As God's people, we can trust in His preserving power for all of our activity - "both our going out and our coming in" - and we can trust in Him at all times - "from this time and forever."

When life gets hard, we would do well to read again the precious promises recorded in Psalm 121. This psalm is a great reminder that we are not alone in our journey through life. Like David, we must learn to look beyond the hills to the God who made them. God is certainly with us every step of the way, providing us with the help and the protection we so desperately need. David's words are a source of comfort and strength as we face difficult times or uncertain futures.

Frances Havergal (1836-1879) was an unusual woman. The daughter of a minister, she mastered Greek and Hebrew to read the scriptures in their original languages. Having grown up in England, she traveled in Europe and enjoyed skiing in the Swiss Alps --- an unusual recreation in the nineteenth century. She was also an accomplished singer who sometimes sang with the Philharmonic.

Havergal was a Christian all her life, but at age 36 experienced what we might describe as a conversion experience. A little book entitled All for Jesus made her aware of the incompleteness of her own devotion, and she rededicated her life to

Soon thereafter, she spent five days with a small group of people, some of whom were not Christians, and others of whom were lukewarm. She spent those five days witnessing to them and praying for them, and was delighted to see her prayers answered. By the end of that week, all ten people had devoted themselves to Christ. That night, too excited to sleep, Havergal sat up writing this hymn, "Take My Life and Let It Be" based off of Leviticus 11:44.

> Take my life, and let it be; Consecrated, Lord, to Thee; Take my moments and my days, Let them flow in ceaseless praise. Let them flow in ceaseless praise.

Take my silver and my gold: Not a mite would I withhold; Take my intellect, and use; Ev'ry pow'r as Thou shalt choose. Ev'ry pow'r as Thou shalt choose.

Take my will, and make it Thine, It shall be no longer mine; Take my heart, it is Thine own, It shall be Thy royal throne. It shall be Thy royal throne.

Take my love, my Lord, I pour; At Thy feet its treasure store; Take myself, and I will be, Ever, only, all for Thee. Ever, only, all for Thee.
