The screen on my office phone is fading. I have tried to adjust the contrast and the brightness in a myriad of different ways, but it is still faded. I can see what it says if I adjust my head the right way and look at it in just the right light, but any angle under the just right one it is faded.

I have days when I feel like that screen. I feel like I am fading and like I can keep up the facade as long as people are looking in just the right place, but if they were to look at me from a different angle or in a different light they would see that I am struggling, just trying to make it through the week.

Have you ever felt like that? Like you are fading? Like you are tired, but the rest that you are looking for is too many days away or not in sight at all.

In *The Fellowship of the Rings* Bilbo tells Gandalf, "I feel thin..sort of stretched like butter scraped over too much bread." I come back to that idea often. I find myself pushing through, trying to find the right things to say, the right moments to move, the right ways to spend my resources and energy, but I end up feeling stretched and thin. If I'm not careful, like pizza dough stretched too much, I will develop tears and holes as I try to get everything accomplished.

If you have ever felt this way too, guess what — the Bible has hope for you. In my daily reading today I stumbled on this verse. Lamentations 3:19–24 (CSB)

I sometimes feel like I am fading. I sometimes feel stretched thin, but I can call this to mind and have hope. The Lord's mercies never end. They are new and fresh every morning. The Lord is my portion. I will put my hope in him.

On those days when you are feeling stretched; on those days when every word seems like one more attack; on those days when tears seem to live at the corners of your eyes, you have hope. The God who loves you calls you to rest. The God who loves you has a yoke that is easy and a burden that is light. Trust in Him. Hope in Him. He will see you through.

A lone teenager's masterful poetic message finds it way around the world.

Occasionally, in the search for information concerning the story behind a particular hymn obstacles are encountered. Such is the case with one of our best-loved hymns, "My Jesus, I Love Thee."

It was not until recent years that the identity of the teenage songwriter, William Ralph Featherstone (1846-1873), became known. It is reported that he probably grew up in Canada, and it was in Toronto in 1862, that he became a Christian. His conversion experience must have been extraordinary because soon afterward, and in connection with that life-changing event, the 16-year-old wrote a poem, which is still meaningful to millions of people in many lands.

Some historians have said that William mailed the poem to a relative in Los Angeles. From there, it probably made its way to England in as much as it appeared in print in The London Hymnal, published in 1864, just two years following his conversion.

Years later, in Boston, Massachusetts, as Pastor A. J. Gordon was busy compiling a hymnal for Baptist congregations, he saw in The London Hymnbook Featherstone's "My Jesus I Love Thee." However, he was not at all impressed with the musical setting. He was a masterful pianist, so he wrote different music for young Featherstone's poem, music that has carried the lyrics to every corner of our world.


