"After him came Shamgar the son of Anath, who struck down six hundred Philistines with an oxgoad; and he also saved Israel." (Judges 3:31)

I recently about a man in my quiet time who has only a few verses connected to his legacy, and yet his story is quite

amazing. His name is Shamgar and God used this unlikely man to impact an entire nation. Shamgar was not a likely candidate for leadership because he did not come from a believing household. Shamgar was half-Jew and half-pagan. He certainly didn't have the family background to prepare him for the task God called him to do. But we learn that God will use anyone who completely trusts in Him.

According to God's Word, Shamgar struck down 600 Philistines with an oxgoad. He didn't use a fancy spear or sword, but armed with faith in God and obedience to God's will, Shamgar rescued Israel from its enemies. Essentially, God turned a nation back to Himself with a farm tool. There are several lessons from Shamgar's life...

Start where you are. Shamgar didn't wait until every condition was perfect before he took action, but he started where he was. Shamgar was confident that God would lead him forward.

Use what you have. Shamgar used what was already in his hand; he used an oxgoad. The farm tool that Shamgar possessed had a sharp point on one end and a small blade for breaking up clods on the other. Using what he had, Shamgar won the victory. God never calls us to use what we don't have. He calls us to use what we do have to win the victory.

Do what you can. God doesn't intend for everyone to have the same scope of ministry, but we are to do what we can. The truest measure of success is always our obedience to God. Shamgar committed all he had to God and God used an ordinary man, an awkward tool, and limited abilities to impact an entire nation. When something is completely given into God's hand, He will cause it to go further than it's supposed to go and to do things it's not supposed to do.

Like Shamgar, will you start where you are? Will you use what you have? Will you do what you can?

Wonderful grace of Jesus, greater than all my sin; How shall my tongue describe it. where shall its praise begin? Taking away my burden, setting my spirit free, For the wonderful grace of Jesus reaches me!

Wonderful grace of Jesus, reaching to all the lost, By it I have been pardoned, saved to the uttermost: Chains have been torn asunder, giving me liberty, For the wonderful grace of Jesus reaches me!

Wonderful grace of Jesus, reaching the most defiled, By its transforming power, making him God's dear child. Purchasing peace and heaven for all eternity; And the wonderful grace of Jesus reaches me!

REFRAIN: Wonderful the matchless grace of Jesus, Deeper than the mighty rolling sea; Higher than the mountain, sparkling like a fountain, All-sufficient grace for even me; Broader than the scope of my transgressions, Greater far than all my sin and shame: O magnify the precious name of Jesus, praise His name! —Haldor Lillenas (1885-1959)

"Wonderful Grace of Jesus"—the very title proclaims from the outset and at the beginning of each stanza that this hymn by Haldor Lillenas is a hymn of grace. First introduced in 1918, this song has become a favorite across denominational lines in the Church today. Its upbeat, bouncy meter and somewhat unusual refrain, which splits into two parts, with the melody alternating between the bass/tenor and alto/soprano parts, endear the tune to many. However, as is often the case, the strong doctrinal message carried by the words of the hymn are often obscured in the enthusiasm for the music. In fact, the author himself, in his autobiography, cautions against distorting the words of the hymn by performing it at too rapid a tempo.

"Wonderful Grace of Jesus" combines doctrinal truth with a buoyant melody and serves as a good vehicle for teaching the doctrine of grace. It touches on the availability, sufficiency, and efficacy of the salvation offered by grace through faith in Christ, and so carries an appropriate message for believer and unbeliever alike.
