

As I continue to share the story behind the song, this month is one of our newer worship tunes: "Goodness of God" by Jenn Johnson.

"I wrote this song over two years ago. We had just gotten home from our adoption of our son, Ryder. He was a gift that we never saw coming. We have three kids already. We thought we were done having children.

Brian and I were always open to adoption. But, out of the blue, we just felt like the Lord say to us, 'I have this for you if you want this--like a gift. I have a present for you." We knew adoption was the Lord's plan for us; to have a baby again when you've been out of baby season for eight years was such a blessing...

Within the next year, we were matched up. And, we brought our new son home to our family. During the adoption process, I found myself driving on a long country road. I was just singing to the Lord when I recorded a song on my phone about the "faithfulness" and "kindness of God." I wrote and sang most of "Goodness of God" as an overflow of my heart at that moment. That led to finishing and recording this song with Ed Cash, Jason Ingram, and Ben Fielding...

I'm so thankful for God being with me all my life through everything I've been through. His voice has been there comforting and leading and guiding me, no matter how dark the situation. The Word of God and the Holy Spirit is there to guide us in our lives...

"Goodness of God" is a sincere offering of praise back to the Lord: to express our desire to seek His face, feel His peace and hear His voice. Worship is about giving God our best, offering all of ourselves to Him. All we can do is submit to Him. And, give everything we have to Him. According to God's Word in Jeremiah 29:13, we need to search for God with all our heart, and we will find Him. In our fast-paced society, how often are we dedicating our whole heart to God?...

One of the key takeaways of this song is "With my life laid down/I'm surrendered now/I give You everything/'Cause Your goodness is running after/It's running after me." When you abide in His grace, you won't be the same. His grace takes away anxiety, guilt, and shame. Know that being His is enough."

Chorus: And all my life, You have been faithful. And all my life, You have been so, so good. With every breath that I am able; Oh, I will sing of the goodness of God.
