



"Joseph went up from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to Bethlehem... He went there to register with Mary, who was pledged to be married to Him and was expecting a child." (Luke 2:4-5)

As the crow flies, it was a journey of approximately 65 miles but traveling over hills, through villages, and around rivers made the trip even longer. Whether on foot or on the back of a donkey, it wasn't an easy journey, especially for a women nearing the end of her pregnancy.

Why did Mary go to Bethlehem? It's true that government officials had issued a census which required each one to go to their "own city." Each individual was required to travel to the place their family called home for this official registration and counting. But perhaps Mary welcomed the idea to leave the small village of Nazareth where tongues were wagging about her pregnancy and unmarried status. I trust Mary and Joseph knew they were going far from family and into a city whose streets would be packed with traveling strangers. They were assured of no warm welcome and no cozy place to birth the expected child. In almost every way, Jospeh and Mary were traveling into the unknown. Their journey was long and hard and uncertain.

Nearly nine months before Joseph and Mary's arrival in Bethlehem, Mary spoke life-changing words to God. When the angel presented Mary with the assignment of giving birth to God's son, she testified: "I am the Lord's servant. May it be to me as You have said." With those simple words of faith, Mary could endure the long journey, the cold streets of Bethlehem, the staring glances of strangers, and even the unkept stable with its manger.

When we submit ourselves as servants to a loving God, we can say to God what Mary said: "May it be to me as You have said." When we surrender ourselves to a good God, we can be confident that He will lead and guide us. Our God is faithful and He will equip us to complete the assignment He has prepared for us.

As we celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, I pray our faith will be renewed as we focus on the Christ of Christmas!

The lyrics to "O Little Town of Bethlehem" were written by Phillips Brooks in 1868 after visiting the town of Bethlehem on his trip to the Holy Land two years earlier. Since that time, this song has become a favorite for many people as they celebrate the Christmas season.

When Phillips Brooks was rector of Holy Trinity, Philadelphia, his parishioners in August 1865, sent him abroad for a year. His travels took him through Europe, and in December to the Holy Land. Here with reverent feet, he traced the footsteps of his Lord and Master from Nazareth southward and visited the scenes of the Bible narrative.

After two weeks spent in Jerusalem, Christmas Eve found him in "the little town of Bethlehem" at the birthplace of Jesus. Of his stirring emotions on that "Holy Night" he later wrote to his Sunday school back in Philadelphia:

"I remember especially on Christmas Eve, when I was standing in the old church at Bethlehem, close to the spot where Jesus was born, when the whole church was ringing hour after hour with the splendid hymns of praise to God, how again and again it seemed as if I could hear voices that I knew well, telling each other of the 'Wonderful Night' of the Savior's birth, as I had heard the year before; and I assure you I was glad to shut my ears for a while and listen to the more familiar strains that came wandering to me halfway round the world."

Two years after his return to America, still full of the thrilling memories of Bethlehem, Phillips Brooks wrote for his Sunday school of children, the Christmas hymn, "O Little Town of Bethlehem," which for a long time had been singing in his soul. In this he has embodied, as in the prose descriptions of places visited in the Holy Land, the spiritual meaning of what he there saw.
